What's the key to surviving breast cancer? You.

It takes approximately 15 minutes to complete a mammogram once a year starting at age 45.

On average, women spend an astonishing 35 minutes daily on Facebook, 25 minutes on Snapchat and Instagram, 40 minutes on YouTube, and 1 minute on Twitter.

Spending 15 minutes on a #mammogram could save your life; 35 minutes on #Facebook is time loss in the battle against breast cancer.

You've quit smoking. Now, quit worrying.

KHC offers screening for people at high risk for lung cancer. The simple and quick scan, called a low-dose computed tomography (LDCT), is the only recommended screening test for the disease. If caught early, lung cancer can be treated with surgery and survival rates can dramatically improve.

In fact, five-year survival rates for people with non-small cell lung cancer can increase from 15 percent to 84 percent when caught early. You may benefit from annual screening **if all of these are true:**

- You are between 55 and 80 years old.
- You currently smoke; or you quit in the last 15 years.
- You smoked an average of at least 1 pack a day for 30 years or 2 packs a day for 15 years.

If you think you qualify for the screening, ask your primary care provider for a referral.



Mythbusting the colonoscopy

Getting screened for colorectal cancer, starting at age 50 for most people, is a "no-brainer." The benefits far outweigh the most "difficult" part, drinking a solution that empties your bowels before the procedure.

- It's affordable; screenings are covered by insurance.
- It's an outpatient procedure; no hospital stay.
- It's comfortable. You are given anesthesia and pain medication; some patients may have vague or no recollection of the procedure. A lot of people wake up and ask, "Have you started yet?"

Cancer prevention starts with pre-teens

Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine protects against cancers caused by HPV infection. HPV is a common virus that infects teens and adults. HPV can cause cancer in both men and women.

All 11-12 year olds should get two shots of HPV vaccine six to 12 months apart. Getting vaccinated on time protects preteens long before being exposed to the virus.
